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# 1. Introduction to Evangelism

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## **6. Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) Based on Common Objections to Christianity**

The complexity and order of the universe point to an intelligent Designer (Psalm 19:1).

### **6.3 How can Christians claim Jesus is the only way to God?**

Answer: Christianity is based on the teachings of Jesus, who claimed to be the only way to God (John 14:6). Christians believe that Jesus' sacrificial death and resurrection are the only means by which our sins can be forgiven and we can be reconciled to God. This claim is unique to Christianity, but it is based on the belief that Jesus is the only one who has dealt with the problem of sin effectively.

#### **6.4 Aren't Christians hypocrites?**

The presence of flaws in the church underscores the need for Jesus' redemptive work. The church, despite its imperfections, plays a crucial role in providing community, teaching, and support for believers. Trust in the church is ultimately rooted in trust in Jesus Christ, who is the head of the church (Ephesians 1:22-23).
